I. Call to Order

- a. Mark called the meeting to order at 3:10 p.m.

II. Approval of Minutes

- a. **Motion #1 (Johnson/Wallace) "Move to approve the minutes from meeting #19-09, May 16, 2019 as written."**
- b. **Motion passed unanimous voice vote.**

III. Introductions

- a. Silent roll call was taken and introductions were made. With 12 voting members in attendance, quorum was met.

IV. Open Forum

- a. None

V. Community Reports

a. ASI President - Mark Borges

- i. Mark gave a brief background about himself stating that his platform for the year will include sustainability, diversity & inclusion, health & wellbeing and empowering student voters.
- ii. He reported that he had the opportunity to attend the Panetta Institute for Public Policy founded by Leon Panetta, former Secretary of Defense, Director of the CIA, and White House Chief of Staff.
- iii. He stated that the ASI Leadership Team traveled to Fullerton for the CSUnity conference. He stated that he was elected as the Sustainability Officer for the California State Student Association (CSSA).

- iv. Mark stated that he has been speaking at SLODays to incoming freshmen.
- v. He reported that efforts will continue to promote civic engagement on campus.

b. ASCC President - Lindsay Bachman

- i. Absent
- ii. Anthony announced that 9,000 students were registered for fall quarter at Cuesta and stated that attendance is lower than usual. They held orientation last week.

c. Residents for Quality Neighborhoods - Sandra Rowley

- i. Sandra expressed her concern about the parking in the neighborhoods. Mark stated that this is a discussion item to potentially be brought to a future meeting.

d. City Manager - Derek Johnson

- i. Derek reported that Council adopted the budget and goals for the year. Goals include Climate Action, Sustainable transportation, fiscal sustainable responsibility, housing, and downtown vitality
- ii. Council approved an agreement for legal services for the Water Resource Recovery Facility Project to modernize an 80-year-old facility.
- iii. Other topics Council discussed included:
 - 1. Appointments to the Housing Authority Board
 - 2. Marsh Street Bridge Replacement Project
 - 3. Animal Care & Control Services contract
 - 4. State Park Grant opportunities
 - 5. Downtown Association proposal
 - 6. Update of Bob Jones Trail
- iv. Derek spoke of the Emergency Response Plan from PG&E.

VI. Business/Discussion Items

a. 2019-20 SCLC Meeting Schedule

- i. Mark stated that historically, the SCLC meetings are scheduled for the third Thursday of each month, however, last year, SCLC approved bi-monthly meetings during the months of August, September, November, January, March, and May. He stated that the decision will be reviewed in January 2020.
- ii. Motion #3 (Pease/Rowley) "Move to approve the 2019-20 SCLC meeting schedule."
- iii. Motion passed unanimous vote.

b. Renewal of the Designated Voter Form

- i. Mark reminded members to submit their designated voter form.

c. Cal Poly Move-In Presentation - University Housing

- ii. Dr. Jo Campbell and Jessica Haecherl gave a broad overview of Cal Poly move-in dates. They stated that there are six drop off zones and are divided by housing locations. University Housing is asking for volunteers during move-in. They spoke about communication of move-in information through SLODays, social media, and multiple emails regarding move-in. Jessica announced that students can purchase reusable items from the Cal Poly Thrift store.

d. Week of Welcome (WOW) Presentation - New Student & Transition Programs

- i. Andrene K. Kawai introduced the Cal Poly Orientation Team. They gave an overview of upcoming festivities including welcoming 5,500 new students, 750 orientation leaders, 323 WOW groups, and 56 event staffers. They gave an update on the week's events including Big Fall Welcome, Wow-a-Rama, College Connections, Resource Fair and Club Showcase.

e. 2019-20 SCLC Goal Setting

- i. Mark stated that after speaking with former SCLC chairs, he initiated a survey on what are the priorities that SCLC can address. The top priorities included diversity & inclusion efforts, parking and noise, housing and emergency response efforts.
- ii. He stated that Cal Poly is currently reviewing the survey results from the CPX Survey addressing diversity & inclusion and could potentially give opportunities for SCLC to address.
- iii. In regards to emergency response, PG&E released the emergency shut down plan in case of fires. SCLC could address how the city/county is responding.
- iv. He stated that parking and noise is an ongoing discussion and has made many strides. Sandra expressed her concern about parking in the neighborhoods that has not been addressed. Mark mentioned that we could bring in the experts on the topic for discussion.
- v. Other discussion suggestions included Cal Poly Masterplan overview, vaping educational campaign, Center for Action presentation.
