RESOLUTION FOR CAL POLY CORPORATION TO MOVE TO A ROLL OVER DONATION MODEL

WHEREAS: The ASI Board of Directors serves as the official voice of students

at California Polytechnic State University (Cal Poly), San Luis

Obispo; and

WHEREAS: Students who experience food insecurity report worse physical

health, mental health, and lower GPAs in comparison to their food

secure peers¹; and

WHEREAS: On a whole, 41.6% of CSU students report food insecurity²; and

WHEREAS: According to the Cal Poly Basic Needs Task Force Report of Fall

2018, 27% of Cal Poly students experience food insecurity³; and

WHEREAS: These problems impact thousands of Cal Poly students,

disproportionately affecting first-generation college students, students of color, and students from lower socio-economic

backgrounds4; and

WHEREAS: In the interest of achieving CSU Graduation Initiative 2025, Cal Poly

has recognized that students should have university-wide support

in reaching graduation⁵; and

WHEREAS: Cal Poly is still one of nineteen CSU campuses who have yet to

recognize food security issues as part of their short- or long-term

Graduation initiative plans⁶; and

WHEREAS: While Cal Poly has created initiatives on campus, partnering with

both students and Cal Poly Corporation to increase access to basic needs, the preexisting programs lack financial support from the

University⁷; and

WHEREAS: For example, programs such as Mustang Meal Share exist to ensure

students have access to nutritious meals through a partnership with Cal Poly Corporation in which students are eligible to donate

their declining balance from their campus meal plans8; and

WHEREAS: Within the 2018-2019 school year only 11,902 meals were donated

to the Mustang Meal Share Program -- yet the goal was 20,0009;

and

WHEREAS: In order to adequately fund the program, Cal Poly Corporation

made a one-time donation of roughly \$60,000¹⁰; and

WHEREAS: Because external donations, such as Cal Poly Corporation's, are

neither recurring nor guaranteed, the current donation model is too restrictive and understaffed to encourage students to fully

fund the program; and

WHEREAS: With less than a dozen members and no institutional support, the

method for collecting donations through Swipe Out Hunger is

understaffed and under supported¹¹; and

WHEREAS: A policy change allowing for donation roll over would benefit all

stakeholders on campus: volunteers experience less pressure to collect donations and students can choose to save their declining

balance until spring; and

WHEREAS: This proposed donation roll over policy is consistent with the

current roll over policy for student meal plans in which unused declining balance rolls over to the next quarter with remaining

funds at the end of spring quarter being forfeited¹²

THEREFORE BE IT

RESOLVED: The ASI Board of Directors hereby urges Cal Poly Corporation to

modify the donation policy for Mustang Meal Share to allow for donation limits to roll over on a quarterly basis in an effort to

better support food insecure students on campus; and

FURTHERMORE

BE IT

RESOLVED: The ASI Board of Directors encourages Cal Poly stakeholders,

including ASI, to critically evaluate the effectiveness of existing

basic needs programs and refine such programs to ensure methodical, comprehensive support for basic needs on campus;

and
